Healing Examples:

1. Healing of Peter's Mother-in-Law

Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed and feverish, and at once they told Jesus about her. He went in to her, took her by the hand and helped her get up.

And the fever left her and she began to serve them. (Mark 1: 30-31)

2. Healing of Man with Skin Disease

A man suffering from a virulent skin disease came to him and pleaded on his knees saying, 'If you are willing, you can cleanse me.'

Feeling compassion for him, Jesus stretched out his hand, touched him and said to him, 'I am willing. Be cleansed.' And at once the skin disease left him and he was cleansed. And at once Jesus sternly sent him away and said to him, 'Mind you tell no one anything.' (Mark 1: 40-44)

3. Bartimaeus Healing Incident

They reached Jericho; and as Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a great crowd, Bartimaeus – that is, the son of Timaeus – a <u>blind beggar</u> was sitting at the <u>side of the road</u>.

When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and cry out, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them <u>scolded him</u> and told him to keep quiet, but he shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.'

So <u>throwing off his cloak</u>, he jumped up and <u>went to see Jesus</u>. Then <u>Jesus spoke</u>, 'What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "Rabbuni, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go, your faith has saved you.'At once his <u>sight returned</u> and he <u>followed him along the road</u>. (Mark 10:46-52)
